What is trying to be achieved in the local area is connectivity by linking suburbs and areas together.

An example of this is the 1.2-km wheelchair-friendly walk/cycle path through Jack Barclay Park off Gledson Street, North Booval. This links North Booval residents to the Bundamba Pool and school area.

Pathways which enable ease of getting around safely on the footpath are, and will be into the future, a major issue for Cr Nardi and a planned network for the entire division has been put in place.

It is also time to remember to conserve water. Level 3 restrictions are just around the corner and this will mean only buckets or watering cans can be used.

Warrego to Cunningham highway connection

The Queensland State Government has announced that option "B" is their preferred corridor option for the Warrego

to Cunningham Highway Connection.

Option "B" will connect the highways to the west of New Chum Road. The corridor will cross Brisbane Road to the east of the

Noel Street intersection and then travel west of River Road, Dinmore, connecting to the Warrego Highway east of the power transmission lines.

There are many reasons necessitating the building of this connection, one of which is to alleviate the amount of heavy transport

passing the school and residences on River Road, Dinmore.

> A short-term solution for heavy vehicles will be the extension of Hoepner Road, Bundamba near the Capral Aluminium plant to link onto Brisbane Road at Ebbw Vale between the Ebbw Vale railway station and the new Denmac Ford Showroom.

All of these options will be some time away and as your local government community representative, Cr Nardi will encourage all those involved in these projects to get on with them to have the best outcome for the community.

World War I I veteran recognised

Cr Nardi has known Baden Jones for nearly 40 years, but what he didn't know about this quiet man until recent years was his war service.


Baden Jones was a prisoner of war (POW), held captive in Changi Prison in Singapore.

During this time he was forced to work on the infamous Thai Burma Railway (the "Railway of Death").

It is only recently that Baden has spoken about his and his mates' experiences, particularly on the Thai Burma Railway where so many lost their lives.

Baden served in the 2/30 Battalion AIF, which was the first battalion deployed in Central Malaysia during World War II.

After Baden was discharged from service, he worked as a shunter with Queensland Railways until his retirement.

Baden was a keen player of lawn bowls and was instrumental in the foundation of the "Malaysia Cup", an annual event run by the United Services Bowls Club.

As recognition of Baden and his service to Australia, Cr Nardi had the pleasure 12 months ago of announcing the naming of a road in his honour.

The new road, to be named Baden Jones Drive, is situated as the main entrance into a new residential estate off North Station Road. North Booval.

In the early days of Baden's life he had a farm very near this location and lived in North Station Road, North Booval for many years, which is where Cr Nardi first met

The pair shared time together, along with Baden's next-door neighbour Peter Grennan, during the 1974 flood.

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
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
